

# Legislative Update Washington State Society of Anesthesiologists

This week the first cutoff of the 2024 legislative session occurs on Wednesday, and any bills that remain in their policy committee of origin are considered "dead" for the year. Following the cutoff, legislators will spend less than a week in fiscal committees hearing and advancing bills with ties to the budget, which have to move forward by Monday February 5<sup>th</sup> to remain viable.

<u>Senate Bill 5184</u>, which authorizes the licensure of Certified Anesthesiologist Assistants in Washington, was pulled out of the Rules Committee last week. This means the bill now awaits a vote by the entire Senate. To continue moving through the legislative session, the Senate has until February 13th to approve the legislation, after which, it will then be taken up the House of Representatives.

The Senate Health Care & Wellness Committee heard <u>Senate Bill 6286</u> on Friday, January 26. The bill, introduced to address concerns raised by the CRNAs as part of the CAA negotiations, would develop a grant program to precept nurse anesthesia residents. It also directs the Health Workforce Council to study Washington's anesthesia workforce shortages. WSSA and WAAA testified in support of the bill. The WA Association of Nurse Anesthetists signed in "other" (rather than pro or con) and testified about the challenges CRNAs face in Washington. The bill is scheduled for a vote out of Committee this coming week.

Finally, <u>House Bill 2073</u> was approved by the House Committee on Environment & Energy – with an amendment requested by WSSA. The bill requires the Department of Ecology to complete a study and develop recommendations on addressing a variety of greenhouse gases with global warming impacts – including aesthetic gases. Following the study, the Department must develop a guidance document about reducing greenhouse gas emissions from the use of anesthetic gases and requires facilities to use the guidelines beginning July 1, 2026. At WSSA's request, the bill was amended to allow for "flexibility for extenuating clinical circumstances when a medical professional is of the opinion that unrestricted use of anesthetic gases is needed for patient safety and comfort." The bill now moves to the House Appropriations Committee for consideration, and a public hearing is scheduled for Saturday 2/3.

Violations of the law are enforced by the Attorney General under the consumer protection act, authorizing treble damages in the event of violations.

Requirements are imposed related to a screening process which must be provided by a licensed medical or mental health provider for participants to receive psilocybin services. Conditions that must be screened for are outlined in the bill, and in some cases participants would be barred from receiving psilocybin services based on their answers, and in other cases would be $\hat{a} \in \mathfrak{Q}$ necouraged to consult $\hat{a} \in \bullet$ a health care provider regarding the risk of consuming psilocybin. The Department of Health is granted rulemaking authority to establish guidelines for evidence-based or research-based additional screening exclusions. Prohibits psilocybin organizations from making claims that psilocybin products and services have curative or therapeutic effects or make other health care claims that are $\hat{a} \in \mathfrak{Q}$ not supported by the totality of publicly available scientific evidence.
